A Pitch for our project

If your soul needs soothing, and even if all you want is some delight in life, take a walk in the cool of the evening in our valley. While you walk, pat yourselves on the back and marvel at the growth of our plantings. It is staggering how quickly and how beautifully this former weed infested valley has become a rich home for native plants and birds and no doubt lizards (see below.)

Any time you go there, look out for weeds particularly strangling weeds, killers such as blue morning glory. There are still a few climbing up our plants. A quick tug can free the plants they are strangling. Standup weeding works well.





Planned Planting

Due to the Covid lockdown, the final piece of punga and other plants planned for planting, along the Ada St side of the stream closer to Middleton did not take place. This will be done as soon as possible in the new planting season – around May or June.

Privets

Plans for privet in 2022

In the tree cutting season, autumn, Te Ngahere will continue with the removal of large privet trees in accordance with our budget.

Meantime, there are smaller privets establishing themselves every where......

If you want to tackle small privet on your own property, cut it back and use Weed Weapon Stump Stop by Kiwicare, easy to use. Carole and Penny both have some which you are welcome to borrow to paste on the cut surfaces.

If you have other weeds you'd like to tackle, try weed and plant database for good information:

New Zealand Plant Conservation Network Weedbusters

Forest and Bird also has an excellent <u>weed</u> <u>control guide</u>.



Rats

Like everything in our lives, our rat programme hit a bump with Covid. It will be restarted under Matt from Te Ngahere the week of Dec 6 th . Anyone from Te Ngahere who is working with us will be double vaccinated. Permission for access will be sought from owners of properties where rat tracking or baiting will take place. If you are already part of our rat group, you will have received an email asking if you want more details.

A reminder: putting left over bread outside to feed the 'birds' largely feeds the rats, they love it. If you have neighbours doing this, they may not be part of our group and will not get this email. You could encourage them to join us while gently pointing out to them that the rats who thrive on the bread will kill the birds and their eggs.



Rosie and the birds

We have a Ph.D. student, Rosie, who is collecting data for her research. Our valley is one of the sites where she is comparing bird activity, using thermal cameras, in areas which have active animal pest control programmes against those which do not – unfortunately ours falls into the latter at the moment, refer above.

Two weeks ago, while working in the Waiatarua Reserve, she heard and saw a bird she didn't recognise – watch Rosie on TVNZ 7 Sharp! Enjoy!
